Torchbearer Program for ACC Graduates



ADVANCING FAC'S LEGISLATIVE AGENDA



The core mission of the Florida Association of Counties (FAC) is to help counties effectively serve and represent Floridians by strengthening and preserving county home rule through advocacy, education and collaboration. FAC provides county officials with an array of legislative activities to carry out this mission.

FAC'S LEGISLATIVE PROCESS

The Florida Association of Counties is called upon to represent counties year-round before the state Legislature, the Governor and Cabinet, and various state agencies and commissions. FAC's guiding principles seek to promote county home rule authority, to provide a voice for the development and implementation of state-wide policies, and to protect local citizenry and businesses from the financial burden of unfunded mandates.

Determining the consensus position of Florida counties is paramount to FAC's annual policy development effort. The process is designed to prioritize issues critical to counties in a diverse state through five standing legislative policy committees and two caucuses representing urban and rural communities. County commissioners are appointed by the FAC President to guide each committee's work. Service on a policy committee is voluntary and open to all county commissioners.

The standing committees are individually tasked to develop and recommend an annual statewide legislative platform for counties based on each of the policy areas under their jurisdiction. Committees operate on a consensus basis, working toward legislative positions that represent broad support among counties. Although county staff may serve as technical support, only commissioners may vote. Policy committees generally meet twice a year—a meeting in the fall and a wrap-up meeting at the Legislative Conference in November. During the Legislative Conference, the general membership approves the legislative program for the ensuing legislative session.

Committees and caucuses are as follows:

Health & Human Services: focuses on issues related to social services, health care, behavioral health, elder care, child welfare, emergency medical services and workforce development.

Finance, Tax & Administration: explores a wide array of issues affecting county funding, including fiscal management, home rule, county structure and management, economic development, tax structure and appropriations.

Public Safety: concentrates on general public safety, the judicial system, juvenile detention, impacts to county jails and emergency management.

Growth Management, Agriculture & Environment: develops policy relating to land use planning, environmental resources, property rights, community development, transportation, affordable housing, agriculture, and energy.

Federal: develops a focused advocacy agenda and informational priorities for federal issues affecting counties, including legislative, judicial and executive actions.

Urban Caucus: provides a forum for counties with populations of 750,000 or more, as well as those with a budget of \$1 billion or higher, to exchange ideas on issues of mutual interest to urban county officials.

Rural Caucus: provides a forum where smaller counties can identify priorities, strategize and share solutions on issues of rural significance.

In addition to standing committees, the FAC Board of Directors and/or its Executive Committee may approve additional workgroups or select committees to address key issues of pressing concern to counties.


