Keep calling, emailing your legislators and talking about preemption issues at home

The massive preemption issues facing Florida's counties have by and large slowed in the legislative process. This means that legislators are hearing you and more carefully considering these proposals. There are still 18 days to go until the end of session. We are in the third quarter and while the game is going well there is still a lot of time left. So don't stop!

We must all heed Mark Twain's warning: "No man's life, liberty, or property are safe while the legislature is in session."

### **Homestead Exemption:**

This bill has yet to be heard in its 2nd of three committee stops in the Senate and the House bill has not yet received its committee assignments. While seeing this bill slow down is hopeful, with a \$750 million statewide impact we cannot slow down.

### **Super Preemption:**

This bill started with a lot of momentum but your loud voices have caused it to screech to a halt. House Bill 17 has one more committee stop but it hasn't been scheduled for close to a month. The Senate Bill (1158) has yet to be heard in any of its four committee stops. In addition the press continues to cover this legislation, publishing <u>78 articles</u> in the last month alone.

### **Short Term Rentals:**

These bills continue to move and still need your voice. The bills would remove your ability to regulate noise or even parking at vacation rental properties. The House Bill 425 has one more committee stop in the Commerce Committee but it has not been calendared for a hearing. The Senate Bill 188 will be heard this afternoon at 4:00pm in the Community Affairs Committee. If it passes that committee, it will have one more committee stop in the Senate.



# **FAC Priority: Opioid Epidemic**

SB788 (Sen. Clemons) –related to marketing practices for substance abuse services is scheduled to beheard on Wednesday, 4/19/17 in the Senate Rules Committee.

SB 588 (Sen.Passidomo) is the companion bill to HB 249 (Rep. Rommel) encourages first responders to report certain overdose incident data to the Department of Health within 120



hours ofthe incident through the existing state Emergency Medical Service Tracking andReporting System (or other appropriate method) and requires the Department tomake the information available to local government agencies no later than 120hours after receipt. <a href="SB8">SB8</a> is scheduledto be heard on Monday, 4/17/17 in the Senate Criminal Justice committee. <a href="HB 249">HB 249</a> is on 2nd reading calendar in the House.

SB 150(Rep. Steube) / HB 477(Rep. Boyd) creates crimes of trafficking in fentanyl and

synthetic drugs andincreases penalties for some drug related offenses. This is the prioritylegislation for the Florida Sheriffs Association. <u>SB 150</u>is scheduled to be heard in the Senate Judiciary committee on Wednesday,4/19/17. <u>HB 477</u> has been placed on the special order calendarfor Tuesday 4/18/17 and will be heard on 2nd reading.

Last week, the Governor and Attorney General announced a series of opioid workshops to hear from Florida's communities on the impact of the Opioid Epidemic. Workshops scheduled are:



HouseProposed Tax Cut Package - HB 7109 - The proposed 2017 House tax cutpackage has yet to receive any further committee references. Based on FAC's analysis of the proposed tax cut concepts, Counties will experience an estimated \$33million recurring impact statewide.

10% Assessment Limit on Non-Homestead Property - SB 76 (Sen. Lee) was unanimously passed on Wednesday, 4/12/17 by the Senate Rules Committee and nowit heads to the Senate Floor.

<u>SB 10</u> (Sen. Bradley) – Relating to Water Resourcespassed off the Senate floor and is now in House messages.

### FloridaCriminal Justice Reform Task Force: <u>SB 458</u> / <u>HB 387</u>

- SB 458 (Sen.Brandes) was passed unanimously on 4/5/17 by the SenateAppropriations committee.

### Relatingto Sentencing: <u>SB 1068</u> / <u>HB 157</u>

- SB 1068 (Sen.Brandes) was unanimously passed on 4/13/17 by the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Criminal and Civil Justice.

### Clerks of the Circuit Court: SB 2056

- SB 2506, whichprovides for additional funds for clerks and a mechanism to adjust for budgetfluctuations during the year, was passed off the Senate Floor, received bythe House which took up the bill and amended the legislation and ultimatelyagreed to include the subject matter of the bill as a part of the upcomingbudget conference.
- HB 7051 revises the way in which clerk of court budgets would be approved. Specifically, itremoves the duties of LBC regarding budgets of Florida Clerks of CourtOperations Corporation & clerks of court; revises duties of thecorporation; revises budgeting requirements for court-related costs of clerks of court; requires cost of certain changes in court rules & administrativeorders to be reviewed by Criminal Justice Estimating Conference; revises duties of JAC relating to budgets & payroll of clerks of court. HB 7051 passed out of the House Judiciary committee on 4/13/17 andis now headed to the House Floor.

### Worker's Compensation -SB 1582/ HB 7085

- SB 1582 (Sen.Bradley) was passed in the Appropriations committee on 4/10/17. The
  Senate version would cap attorneys' feesat \$250 and would require individual
  insurers to file their own rate requests rather than the requests being filed by the
  National Council on CompensationInsurance. The bill now includes language that
  would deem multiple myeloma and non-Hodgkin's lymphoma to beoccupational
  diseases for firefighters for purposes of workers' compensation.
- <u>HB 7085</u> (Rep.Burgess) is on Special Order Calendar for 4/18/17. Among other provisions, the House version of the workers' compensation reform would limit claimants' attorney's fees to \$150.
